

From the President's Desk

Well, this has certainly been an interesting few months, hasn't it? While we are living in unprecedented times, Sacred Heart School has continued to move forward valiantly. I am so proud of our faculty, staff, parents, and especially our students!

With only one day's warning last spring, Sacred Heart School pivoted from a traditional educational instruction model to virtual learning via distance education. I am firmly convinced that this was only possible because we were open to where the Holy Spirit was guiding us as a community of faith.

To fully grasp the monumental challenge and success, here are a few statistics:

- March 17 was the last day of traditional classroom learning. Ms. McMullin taught her classes effectively in a remote format on March 18. The rest of the faculty was quick to follow.
- SHS maintained a 97.5% student attendance rate during distance learning in the fourth quarter.
- Well over 300 academic zoom sessions were held weekly. Even our specials classes continued through the distance learning process.
- Students in grades 6-12 averaged 20 hours a week of direct faculty instruction. Students in grades K-5 averaged approximately 10 hours a week of faculty instruction accompanied by intricate daily lesson plans, recorded lessons, and zoom tutoring sessions.
- Best of all, for the most part, core courses at each grade level ended the year on schedule from a curriculum standpoint.

As of this writing we are still offering in-person education, and we continue to pray each day that this will continue. Our enrollment is up by 7% over last year, and we added two sections of both kindergarten and first grade.

While we will never be free of financial challenges, we are very happy to report that we ended the 2019-2020 school year in the black, and we are on pace to make this year's Sacred Heart Foundation Annual Fund Drive our most successful ever.

We have so much to be thankful for, and I can honestly say that, through everything we have experienced in the past few months, I have never been more proud to be a Gremlin!



SHS Enhances Fine Arts with the Barbara Lamy Cooney Piano Lab

Sacred Heart is continuing its advancements in music arts and education with the installation of the Barbara Lamy Cooney Piano Lab. This innovative piano lab, made possible by a grant from the Cooney Family Foundation, allows students the opportunity to practice and improve their piano skills at their own pace while still being in a group setting.

The piano lab, which debuted in September 2020, features 17 digital pianos, each equipped with speakers, bench seating, and interactive headphones. Instructions, which are integrated into the K-12 music curriculum, are led by Mr. Darrin Hartman, SHS music director. Using a modern master control unit, Hartman is able to monitor a student's progress and communicate with the student without leaving their desk. Audio routing can also be adjusted from individual learning to group lessons. Since nearly every sound is routed through the headphones, a virtually silent classroom is created with no soundproofing required for the room.

"Studies show that music and the arts strengthen cognitive learning," said Hartman. "The addition of the piano lab presents the arts to our scholars through a different and novel approach."

Hartman added that learning the basics of the piano helps in the progression of all other forms of music such as vocals and band. While a piano lab has been a dream of his for several years, Hartman says its importance couldn't be more timely and relevant given recent health and safety recommendations concerning singing and face coverings.

"We can assure our scholars another avenue to enjoy music in the middle of a pandemic thanks to the generosity of the Cooney Family Foundation," said Hartman.

The Cooney Family Foundation was established in 2016 by Jim and Barbara Cooney, who are longtime leaders in the Sedalia community, lifelong members of St. Vincent de Paul Parish, and graduates of Sacred Heart School -- Jim in 1946 and Barbara in 1954. The mission of the Cooney Family Foundation is to support and promote quality education, arts, and community programming. Reflecting on the Cooney family's Catholic faith and passion for lifelong learning and the arts, special consideration is given to charitable and educational organizations that help individuals become the best versions of themselves.

"I attended Sacred Heart School from the beginning (grade 1-12)," said Jim. "Those years enabled me to receive excellent classic education and form strong spiritual values. I wouldn't trade those opportunities. Catholic school was a strong formation for me."

Jim said he's excited to bring to life a program that can be used by scholars throughout all grades. The piano lab is named in honor of Barbara, a champion for arts education in the community, who passed away in 2019. "Giving back to Sacred Heart is important to Barbara and me," said Jim. "She would be happy."

"Jim and Barbara are the examples of stewards we strive to be: giving of their own gifts and talents so that others may grow in the gifts and talents the Lord has given to them," said Fr. Joe Corel, pastor, St. Vincent De Paul. "God has given many the gift of music. Now, we can

continue to foster those gifts thanks to the gift of the piano lab from the Cooneys. We are most grateful."


By establishing the Cooney Endowment for the Arts, Barbara helped fund multiple art enrichment projects at Sacred Heart School, including the mural of art tiles featured on the first floor of the school, performance risers, and the Visiting Author program. She and Jim were among the first to champion church development campaigns and the Sacred Heart Foundation Annual Fund Drive and other programs that embraced the concept of working together to build a legacy that benefits future generations.

"Grandpa Jim is very happy to be able to make this meaningful gift, and Barbara would undoubtedly be delighted," said Jenny Rinella, vice-president of the Cooney Family Foundation. "I spent many hours playing the piano in their West Broadway home, and she joyfully shared her old sheet music and encouraged me. It's great to think that their generosity will help a new generation to benefit from enhanced music education and opportunities to develop and share their talents in this way."

Dr. Mark Register, SHS president, said that The Barbara Lamy Cooney Piano Lab is another in a long line of gifts from the Cooneys that has immeasurably enhanced the product Sacred Heart offers its school families. "Sacred Heart School treasures its partnership with the Cooney Family," said Dr. Register. "Mrs. Cooney and her legacy inspire young people to find their creative voice. We are humble and grateful."



A Lasting Impact of Service

The Sacred Heart School family sends its prayers, gratitude, and best wishes to **David Fall '78**, who retired from SHS in August, 2020. A lifelong member of Sacred Heart Parish (now SVDP) and graduate of SHS, David joined the staff in 1994 as youth director. He coordinated and chaperoned numerous youth events, including the National Catholic Youth Conference and World Youth Day (St. Louis and Toronto). He expanded the annual March for Life in D.C. to include celebrating Mass at the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception and visiting with state representatives. What began as a



handful of people from Sacred Heart taking spots on a charter bus quickly grew into two charter buses full of parishioners and students. Life as youth director included lock-ins, canoe trips, haunted houses, volunteering at the Missouri Right to Life booth at the Missouri State Fair, and organizing numerous volunteer and fundraising activities. Every step of the way, David and his wife, Sonia, made it a priority to try to make these activities available to every member of the parish and school.

Eventually, David's work flowed into Sacred Heart School to teach a religion class. In 1997, David took on additional responsibilities, becoming head coach of SHS's volleyball program. At that time, no girls sport had won a championship. That would quickly change. In 2000, the Gremlins claimed the district title, soon followed by back-to-back Class 1 state titles in 2007 and 2008. He's quick to shy away from the praise, but the numbers can't be denied. Under his direction, David led the Gremlins to 492 wins and 28 post-season titles. He is also a two-time recipient of the Missouri State High School Class 1 Coach of the Year.

Although his coaching career draws much attention, David's focus has always been on God, faith, family and the overall success of Sacred Heart. Whether it was working as the youth director, teaching, driving the bus, working as athletic director or coaching, he strived to do his job well and with integrity.

David will be enjoying more time with his wife, Sonia, and their children (Jenn (Fall) '02 and Randy Denham '02; and Courtney and Davey Fall '05) and grandchildren Willow and Rowan.

The girls shot a two-day total of 810 outdistancing 2nd place, Brookfield, by 100 strokes in cold and windy conditions at Paradise Point Golf Club in Smithville. Senior Caten Lucchesi powered through the tournament, consistently keeping the ball in the fairway and onto the green. Caten finished the tournament with a score of 176, putting her in 2nd place for the state tournament. The team's first team state title complements the 2010, 2011, and 2012 boys golf championships. Sacred Heart School is soaking up the sunshine and real savings from the solar array canopy installed on the campus last year. The 100-kilowatt solar electricity generation array became fully operational in June 2019. Online tracking and measurement of the energy savings began



July 2019. According to these reports in the first year of operation, the array saved SHS \$13,598.12 in utility costs. The array is installed as a canopy structure over part of the parking lot west of the new gymnasium. This location was ideal for maximizing sun exposure while also adding to the aesthetic and the real value of the school. The total cost of the project was funded entirely through grants and a private donation from long-time Catholic education supporters and St. Vincent de Paul parishioners, Steve and Karen Ellebracht. It's the gift that keeps on giving. Shine on!

"With a three-person administrative team that includes Sam Jones as our dean of students, we have the right team in place to grow our school and move it in a direction that keeps it thriving for years to come, God willing.

Donnie Dobson, a junior at SHS, was recognized by Hamara Enterprises, owner of the Sedalia Wendy's location, for his bravery, heroism, and quick thinking in the aftermath of a fatal car crash at the restaurant. "I heard a big crash ... I saw a truck was through the Wendy's, and I smelled gas, so I hurdled over some debris to go shut off the truck," Donnie shared with the Sedalia Democrat in an interview. "... I checked (the driver) for injuries, he didn't have anything serious



so I got him out of the truck with another gentleman and set him down on a booth." As reported by the *Sedalia Democrat*, Dobson then turned his attention to an injured customer and to a child patron. "I saw his kid watching, and I didn't think he should see his dad in pain so I brought him over to the side and started helping with his wounds. Donovan was noted for his help to police officers and for trying to keep everyone calm as officers and firefighters worked the scene. "...To not even think of themselves and to go help those guys, you couldn't ask for better kids," said Donnie's manager. Donnie is the son of **Betsy Gerke '98**.



A charitable heart and a competitive drive to win the spirit stick helped SHS collect its largest food donation in the history of the school's Thanksgiving food drive. "Cases, not cans" was the challenge, and students in grades K-12 responded. SHS student leaders, faculty, and parents delivered 7,272 pounds of food to Open Door Ministries in November. SHS welcomed the 2020-2021 school year with the appointment of Mrs. Abby Martin as Principal. In this role, Martin will work as a full-time member of the administrative team in the direction, supervision, and evaluation of the school's K-12 instructional program. Martin has been an educator for over ten years, eight of which have been at Catholic schools. She earned her early childhood certificate from SFCC and UCM (2011) and her master's in administration from William Woods University (2014). Martin holds certifications in Initial Missouri Early Childhood Education (Birth-Grade 3) and in Administration (K-8). Prior to joining SHS, Martin served as principal at St. Andrew Catholic School in Tipton (2016 – 2020). In addition to Martin, Sacred Heart's three-person leadership team includes the promotion of Dr. Mark Register from school administrator to President with Mr. Sam Jones continuing in his

role as Dean of Students. Under this new leadership structure, Dr. Register's key priorities will include spiritual leadership, operations, development, and buildings and grounds. Martin and Jones will focus on developing and implementing an effective educational agenda for continued faculty and student developmental success.



Sacred Heart School leadership, parents, students, and members of the community gathered in October to officially celebrate the completion of the school's playground resurfacing from pea gravel to interlocking surface tiles made from 100% recycled tire. Funding was made possible through private donations and grants from the Missouri Department of Natural Resources and West Central Missouri Solid Waste Management District. Ryane City, Office Manager and

playground committee member (pictured with scissors), said the project would use over 70,000 pounds of Missouri scrap rubber, keeping over 3,500 tires out of landfills. The ceremony included a blessing from Fr. David Veit, and celebratory remarks from Mardy Hostetler, SHS parent and project foreman.



Sacred Heart students (grades 1-12) are receiving additional "armor" to assist them along their journey as young disciples and to help them grow in their relationship with Jesus Christ. 

HALL OF FAME COACHES









On February 11, 2020, the SHS Athletic Department recognized the three Hall of Fame coaches from Sacred Heart School. The coaches were recognized with a new banner which hangs on the north wall of the gym.

Palmer Ray Nichols - Nick, as he was known throughout his life, is remembered as a player, coach and official. He played for two years at Smith-Cotton High School. During that time they were 55-5 and won the state basketball championship in 1923. His coaching career started in 1926 as a player/ coach for the Missouri Pacific Railroad Dynamos. He went on to coach this team until 1931. In 1927, he formed Nichols's 5 Pennies, a basketball team that would travel the Midwest. Nichols's 5 Pennies won over 500 games in this barnstorming era. In 1949, Nick joined SHS. Over the next 12 years he compiled a record of 138-112. Sacred Heart won the Pettis-Benton County Championship twice. It is significant that Palmer worked full-time for the Missouri Pacific Lines during the day and conducted practice at night and on weekends. His overall coaching record was 859 – 368. He passed away in 1973. Nick was inducted into the Missouri Sports Hall of Fame in 1990.

Richard J. Bahner '70 - As a Gremlin, Richard played soccer and basketball. For 46 sports seasons, Richard served as head coach for the SHS boys soccer, girls soccer, golf, and softball programs, and as assistant baseball coach. Richard drove the bus to athletic events of all kinds for over 40 years. With Richard as head coach of boys soccer for 26 years, the Gremlins amassed a record of 359-211-37. His teams won a series of 50 consecutive conference wins, 13 conference championships, 4 district championships, and 4 quarterfinal appearances (when there were fewer size divisions). Richard was inducted into the inaugural class of the Missouri State High School Soccer Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 2012.

Steven Goodwin - Steve graduated from Polo High School in 1989. While there, he was an allconference basketball player and an all-state linebacker for the Panthers football team. In 1995 he graduated from Central Missouri State University. His first stop as a head coach was at Linn High School where he led the Wildcats to the 1997 boys basketball Class 2 Final Four. For the past 22 seasons, he has been the boys basketball head coach at Sacred Heart. While at Sacred Heart, his teams have won 9 conference tournament championships, 12 conference championships, 13 district championships, went to two Final Fours, and his 2014 team finished 31-0, winning the Class 2 state title. He has received conference/area coach of the year honors 12 times. In 2006, he also won the state championship in baseball, making him one of the few coaches to win state championships in two sports. Steve was inducted into the Missouri Basketball Coaches Association in 2019.

In Memorial Fr. Vincent Andrew Hoying, C.PP.S. February 21, 1930 – November 17, 2020

Fr. Vince was appointed pastor of Sacred Heart Church, where he served for nine years (1971 – 1980). In 2004, Fr. His personality and approachability quickly endeared him to parishioners, students, faculty, staff, and alumni. In 2008, a special ceremony was held to name Sacred Heart's east

gymnasium the Fr. Vincent Hoying Gymnasium in his honor. Fr. Vince was always proud of his hook shot! He is a member of the SHS Hall of Fame class of 2018.

Marilyn (Fischer) '68 and Jack Arnold

"I can't think of anyone quite like Marilyn Arnold, who exemplifies Christian values, loyalty, and service ... who works so tirelessly for others," said Cindy (Felten) Dick '73. Gremlin pride was instilled into Marilyn as a child. She'd eventually bring her husband, Jack, along for the ride, and together they have lent decades of their time, knowledge, and generous steward hearts to champion Sacred Heart School.

Marilyn was born in Jefferson City to Maurice and Theresa Fischer. She is the second oldest of six siblings, all of whom graduated from Sacred Heart School. Marilyn recalls her first few months of first-grade were taught by Sister Agnesita on the gymnasium stage because everyone was eagerly

awaiting the completion of the 1956 school addition. Elementary days were full of Baltimore Catechism, sweet rolls and milk after first Friday Mass, times tables (and moving to the back of the room if you talked too much) with Mrs. Ilmberger, story time with Mrs. Kennedy, and spontaneous outbursts of singing in 8th grade to It's My Party, Soldier Boy, and Breaking Up is Hard to Do.










Marilyn said that as freshmen, they had to be initiated by the seniors. "This was way more fun for the seniors than us," she recalls. "We were shocked, bobbed for apples in a tank of water with a touch of formaldehyde and doused with flour."

Thankfully, initiation pranks began to taper off, and lighthearted memories began to blossom. Some of her favorite classes were with Sister Rosella, Sister Marie, Sister Dorothy, Sister Gordian, and Mr. Joe Biter. She was an honor roll student and was involved in many high school activities including yearbook, student council, choir, Mizpah, volleyball and cheerleading. Her senior year, Marilyn was editor of the Spectrum yearbook and a homecoming attendant. She graduated from SHS in 1968. She attended Central Missouri State University (now UCM) for two years. She earned her bachelor's degree in pharmacy from the University of Missouri - Kansas City School of Pharmacy in 1974. That same year Marilyn began a pharmacy career that would span over 30 years (1974 – 2012), many of which were served at WEB & Sons (Bing's Pharmacy) in Sedalia.

Jack was born in Kansas City, Missouri, and attended elementary schools throughout Missouri, Kansas and Iowa. In his 8th-grade year, Jack and his family moved to Sedalia. He graduated from Smith-Cotton High School in 1967 and went on to earn a bachelor's degree in accounting from Central Missouri State University (now UCM). He started his career as an internal auditor for Commerce Bancshares and later as a senior accountant for Ernst & Ernst where he obtained his CPA license. Jack and Marilyn married in 1971 and started their family. In 1975 Jack accepted a job as Controller of W J Menefee Construction Company and relocated the family to their hometown of Sedalia. They enrolled their daughters in Sacred Heart School "confident they would receive a quality education."

Jack and Marilyn quickly stepped into the active parents' roles at Sacred Heart, lending time to various school dinners, programs, classroom projects, alumni reunions, and sports activities. Jack accepted a position with the Sacred Heart School Foundation serving for over 30 years as president and treasurer at various times. As one of the early members of the foundation, Jack laid the groundwork for its long-term success. Marilyn's role at Sacred Heart School and Parish included School Advisory Council (president), Active Parent's Club, SH Bazaar (chairperson), Parish Council (secretary), Worship and Spiritual Life, Eucharistic Minister and Adoration Chapel Member. Marilyn was highly involved with church renovations, as well as renovating the convent into what is now the parish center.

After retiring, Jack and Marilyn moved to Olathe, Kansas, to be near their children (Dr. Elizabeth Spenceri '89 and Dr. Jill Jones '95) and four grandchildren. They are members of Holy Spirit Parish where Marilyn serves as Eucharistic Minister and Adoration Chapel Member, and they both volunteer at St. Mary's Food Kitchen in Kansas City, Kansas.



Father Mark Miller C.PP.S.

Fr. Mark Miller has always been the ultimate role model for the students, faculty, parish members, and the community in all areas but especially in the areas of social justice, faith, and positive actions. He was born August 15, 1944 in Trinity, Indiana. He attended Brunnerdale Minor Seminary in Canton, Ohio, and St. Joseph's College in Collegeville, Indiana. He finished his theology studies at the Josephinum Pontifical Seminary in Columbus, Ohio. Fr. Mark was incorporated as a member of the Missionaries of the Precious Blood August 15, 1968, and ordained a Precious Blood priest June 19, 1971.

Following his ordination, Fr. Mark's first assignment was at Sacred Heart School and Parish where he taught at SHS and served as associate pastor at

Sacred Heart Church and St. John the Evangelist missionary church in Bahner from 1971-1977.

For the next 30 years, Fr. Mark held assignments that included formation director, vocation coordinator, and provincial director of the Precious Blood Kansas City Province. He was also elected and served as the Fourth General Councilor of the Missionaries of the Precious Blood in Rome. Fr. Mark served at St. James parish in midtown Kansas City and in the parishes on the southside of Odessa, Texas, before being reassigned in August 2011, as pastor for the Catholic Community of Pettis County, serving the parishes of Sacred Heart, St. Patrick and St. John the Evangelist as well as overseeing Sacred Heart School.

A strong supporter of Sacred Heart School, you could find Fr. Mark teaching and mentoring students in the classrooms, participating in pep rallies and parades, attending sports, drama and music events, and actively participating in fundraisers such as the talent shows, bazaars and concerts. During Fr. Mark's last assignment as pastor in Sedalia, he attended many functions, sometimes in locations other than church or school. At one such occasion, when he entered the room, a young toddler recognized him in the unfamiliar setting, and pointing, with a loud voice, exclaimed "That's my Father!" It was very important to Fr. Mark that everyone who so desired could have the opportunity for a Catholic education, and he worked closely with the school, parish, and community to help make it happen.

With his prayerful spirit, contagious laugh, and the support of many in the community, Sacred Heart Parish retired its debt and was able to complete numerous necessary maintenance projects. One of the final and perhaps most important and pivotal moments in his service was bringing the Catholic Community together as one parish, St. Vincent de Paul. After 48 years of dedicated service, Fr. Mark retired from parish assignments in 2019 and is enjoying retirement in Liberty, Missouri. While his life's work took him many places, it is fitting that Fr. Mark's service as a parish priest began and ended in Sedalia. He has said more than once "this is my home."



Bonnie Diefendorf

For Bonnie Diefendorf, supporting Catholic education and Sacred Heart School has been her lifelong work. Her service to Sacred Heart spans over four decades in numerous capacities from involved parent, elementary teacher, assistant principal, after school care director, and extracurricular advisor to a beloved retired member of the staff who continues to support the school community as a substitute teacher, volunteer and regarded adviser and mentor.

Bonnie, the daughter of Jean and Mervin Ransdell, was born in Red Lodge, Montana. She attended elementary school at St. Andrew's in Tipton (grades 1-4) and Otterville (grades 5-8). She attended high school at St. Scholastica

Academy in Ft. Smith, Arkansas, where she graduated in 1967. She earned her associate's degree from State Fair Community College and her bachelor's in education from Benedictine College in Atchinson, Kansas, in 1972.

Bonnie's teaching career began in January 1972 when she joined the faculty at Sacred Heart School as an educator for a third and fourth grade class. From 1975 to 1979, she left the classroom to focus on her family. She returned to teaching in the fall of 1979 to start the gifted and talented program at Smithton.

In 1981, she rejoined Sacred Heart where she served until her retirement in 2013. She spent 23 years as a full-time elementary teacher (1979-1999) before assuming a role on the administration team as elementary principal (1999-2009) and as full-time teacher and assistant principal (2009-2011). Bonnie served on the Superintendent's Advisory Council for eight years, and served as NHS moderator (1994-2000). She is credited for bringing many new programs to SHS, such as Adopt-an-Artist, Arts Alliance, Afterschool Kids Club, ABC Awards, and the social studies, fine arts and literature fair. Most notably of Bonnie's contributions is the St. Jude Math-a-Thon. Since 1987, students have raised over \$198,000 for the children

at St. Jude Research Hospital battling cancer and other terminal diseases.

By the 1990s, Bonnie's skills in the classroom were finely honed; however, she felt a calling to do more to help SHS grow and thrive into the future. She found time on the nights and weekends to earn her master's degree in elementary administation from Central Missouri State University (now UCM). She also is a graduate of the National Catholic Education Association (NCEA) Principals Academy.

Bonnie was among the first educators to receive the Sacred Heart School Educator of the Year. In 2005, she received the Alpha Delta Kappa Excellence in Education Award. She was also was a diocesan nominee for the NCEA Outstanding Educator two times.

Aside from the long days in the classroom, there would be summers when Bonnie would work a second job to make up for her Catholic school salary. Her colleagues and children recall her coming into school over break to help put fresh paint on the hallways, or to prepare for special activities like bread making for her students receiving First Communion. For many years she coordinated and chaperoned students on the March For Life in D.C., and when her own kids were grown, served as a host family for some of Sacred Heart's high school exchange students, whom she still communicates with.

Bonnie's parish and community work is also far-reaching. She and her husband, Larry, have been members of St. Vincent de Paul Parish for 48 years. She is a member of the Daughters of Isabella and has held leadership positions on parish groups that include Social Concerns, Worship and Spiritual Life, and Christian Education. She served on the Bishop's Pastoral Council for six years. Since 1973, Bonnie has been highly engaged with Missouri Right to Life, holding leadership positions on the local, state and regional level. She also served as chaplain and secretary for the Alpha Delta Kappa (ADK), a national educators' sorority. She volunteers with Community Café, Open Door Thrift Shop, and the Children's Summer Food Program. She and Larry have two children – Jeanenne (Diefendorf) Tornatore '94 and Nathan Diefendorf '93 – and five grandchildren.

"As a graduate of Sacred Heart - and the child of one of its teachers - I spent so much of my childhood inside the halls of this special place, and now as an adult with my own three children in a Catholic elementary school, I often find myself comparing my experience to that of my children. And there is just simply no comparison. Sacred Heart is an anomaly among schools. Even among Catholic schools. And the most significant bricks in the walls of Sacred Heart that set it apart are undoubtedly its teachers and staff, including my mom. To see teachers like my mom who have spent their entire professional careers - and personal lives - making this school the place it has become is a testament to their pure dedication and drive to make a difference in the lives of their students and the community," said Jeanenne (Diefendorf) Tornatore '94, daughter of Bonnie Diefendorf.



Leo and Cecilia Gerke

The value of "putting God first" wasn't just a motto for Leo and Cecilia Gerke, it was a way of life. Their strong foundation of faith and family is a legacy that continues to this day. Since February of 1959, one or more direct descendants of Leo and Cecilia have or is still attending Sacred Heart School.

In the early years of their marriage, Leo worked for the Missouri Pacific Railroad in a position where traveling kept him away from home many days out of the week. Wanting to spend more time at home with Cecilia (who was managing the house) and their growing family, Leo left the railroad to pursue his dream of farming. The Gerkes moved to a farm in Cooper County

and attended St. John's Catholic Church in Clear Creek. Leo and Cecilia also envisioned their young family attending St. John's Catholic School, where Cecilia had attended and had graduated in her 8th grade year.

Mikel Gerke, the oldest of the Gerke children, recalls transportation to St. John Catholic School being an issue for kids in the rural community. "The members of the parish (my Dad included), along with the pastor, attended a County School Board meeting to discuss the issue. The discussion got quite heated. At one point, an attendee who was not a member of the parish told our parish priest that 'if he didn't have that collar on he would take him out behind the building.' At this point, our pastor removed his collar and laid it on the table. Neither went out behind the building, but the county agreed to transport the Catholic kids to the two Catholic schools in the county."

With their sixth child on the way, Leo and Cecilia needed to secure guaranteed income, so they moved the family to a smaller farm where Leo farmed part-time in addition to his full-time job digging holes for telephone poles. The family attended St. Joseph's Catholic Church in Clifton City, and made sure their school-age children were on the bus to attend St. Patrick's School in Sedalia. Three years later, the family moved to Beaman and became members of Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Sedalia. With transportation again being an issue, the Gerke children attended public school, but Leo and Cecilia did not give up on Catholic education for their children.

It was while working one of his various side jobs (pouring concrete) at Sacred Heart Church that the pastor encouraged Leo to start his own business. In a leap of faith, Leo borrowed a truck from Cecilia's parents and started Gerke Construction. By 1959, Leo and Cecilia had moved to Sedalia and thus began the legacy of the Gerke's children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren attending Sacred Heart School.

Support of Sacred Heart Church and School did not end with the enrollment of their children. Leo and Cecilia made many sacrifices to make sure their children took part in extra-curricular activities. Cecilia delighted in attending her children and grandchildren's many school functions. She was an active member of the Daughters of Isabella for over 40 years, Jolly Elders, and the Sacred Heart Altar Society. Cecilia was the first female Eucharistic Minister at Sacred Heart. Leo made many games for the parish Bazaar, served on school board, and was also a Eucharistic minister. He also was a Grand Knight with the Knights of Columbus.

Even after their passing (Leo on January 4, 2005 and Cecilia on February 14, 2018), their legacy still lives on, not only not only in the third-generation of Gerkes attending SHS but in the brick and mortar of the church and school itself. Leo was highly involved in the creation of the stamped wall in front of the rectory, the flooring under the addition to the Hoying Gym, and sidewalks. Cecilia was instrumental in implementing kindergarten at Sacred Heart School.

Sue (Keller) Wise-Hoersten '58

"Has demonstrated loyalty and/or service to Sacred Heart School" reads the Hall of Fame nomination form. Sue Keller Wise, Class of '58, is the embodiment and manifestation of that statement. One only need to spend a few minutes with this lively woman to know that she is a Gremlin through and through. "Sacred Heart School is such a part of me, my development as a person, and that of my family, that it is easy and natural to dedicate my own heart to it," said Sue.

Her school days would be previews of her active life of service to come: Mizpah Pep Club president, Spectrum Yearbook editor, Glee Club, choir, volleyball, softball, cheerleader. One of Sue's fondest memories is that she

was sometimes excused from class to drive the nuns to essential appointments about town, and even taught Sister Aimard how to drive!

One doubts that upon her graduation Sue had any inkling that over 35 years later she would become Sacred Heart School's first Development Director, tasked with developing private resources to support the long-term sustainability and growth of her beloved alma mater. She set the bar high for those who would follow in her footsteps. She was instrumental in establishing the Sacred Heart Foundation's Annual Fund Drive, which to date has raised nearly \$2 million, helping to carry the school through challenging times. Even though Sue stepped down upon moving from Sedalia, she continues to mentor her successors and nurture Sedalia friendships.

The nomination form also reads "has distinguished his/herself in chosen field." She did not always choose her "field," but in prayer and faith gave her all to the field she was in, and in doing so became a role model for others. A mother of seven (four of whom are SHS alumni), an active Catholic, a business woman, a civic leader, a loyal friend, she was "all-in" all the time. Whether in service to Rotary Club, the Chamber of Commerce, Booster Club, Daughters of Isabella, hospice, and many others, her late friend Sherri Osborn once said, "Whatever Sue touches is Dynamo!"

Reflecting on her legacy as the first development director, and once again serving as a role model in service to the faith, Sue and her husband Len recently established an endowed scholarship through the Sacred Heart Foundation. The tuition scholarship was named in memory and honor of her late father, Charles Keller, and will be given in perpetuity.

"Sue has always been a great blessing to our school," said Mark Register, long-time school principal and current president, "She brought enthusiasm, energy, and professionalism at a transformational time in our school's history, and was instrumental in carrying Sacred Heart School into a new century."



Will Kraus '92


Will has dedicated a majority of his career in service to his country. Born in Excelsior Springs, Missouri, to Bill and Cathy Kraus, life eventually brought Will to Sedalia where he attended Sacred Heart School. His school activities included soccer, basketball, and National Honor Society. Following graduation in 1992, Will joined the United States Army and was stationed at Fort Hood Texas. Following his tour, he attended Central Missouri State University (now University of Central Missouri). Will graduated Summa Cum Laude in 1997 with a bachelor's degree in business administration, business management, and a minor in military science.

After graduation, Will took a job with Sprint, serving as the West Region Project Manager (1998 – 2004). That same year, Will continued his military career, joining the United States Army Reserve (1998 – 2011). He served as a Maintenance Company Commander. From 2003 to 2004, Will served in Iraq as Platoon Leader and his Company's ground convoy commander. As an aviator, while serving as an Air Mission Commander in charge of missions involving multiple aircraft, his decisions were responsible for hundreds of soldiers' lives. In 2011, Will joined the Missouri National Guard and he presently serves as a UH60 Black Hawk pilot as well as his Company's Safety Officer.

Will's political career began in 2005 when he was elected to serve as a member of the Missouri House of Representatives, a position he held until 2010. From 2011-2017, Will represented Missouri's 8th State Senate district and served as chairman of the Ways and Means Committee. In 2017, Will was appointed to the Missouri State Tax Commission, which he still serves.

Will has received numerous military awards throughout his service including Air Medal, Meritorious Service Medal, and Army Commendation Medal. His legislative awards include the Americans for Prosperity Defender of Prosperity Award, Missouri Association of Veterans Outstanding Service Award and Missouri Chamber Spirit of Enterprise Award. He's also a five-time recipient of the Lock and Smith Foundation Award (Most Constitutional Senator).

Will is a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion. He and his wife, Carmen live in Lee's Summit, they have two sons, Tylor and Tannor.



Jane McMullin '87

Jane McMullin discovered at a very early age that teaching at Sacred Heart School was where she wanted to be. She has answered that calling to the fullest, which is evident in her devotion to teaching, her dedication to her students, and her love for Sacred Heart School.

Jane has been a fixture at Sacred Heart her entire life. Her parents, Mary Jo (Welliver) '51 and Jesse McMullin, were lifelong members of Sacred Heart Church. Jane received her elementary and high school education at Sacred Heart. Jane was involved in numerous academic and athletic activities including, Student Council (STUCO), National Honor Society (NHS), Science Club, Math Team, Mizpah, basketball, softball, and volleyball. She held

various class officer roles throughout high school and served as STUCO president and NHS vice-president her senior year.


Following graduation in 1987, Jane signed on to play basketball for the East Central College Lady Rebels in Union, Missouri, and graduated with an associate's degree in secondary education. She then went on to earn her bachelor's degree in education and her master's degree in History from UCM.

"Jane's enthusiasm in the classroom is unlimited," said Marcia Turner, Jane's former high school teacher and current colleague. "Her creative approach to history is both challenging and interesting to her students. Her demand for excellence from her students creates an atmosphere of learning that gives students an opportunity to reach heights that they might not have attained."

Jane has received numerous accolades, including Outstanding Graduate Student at UCM and two-time recipient of the Sacred Heart School Teacher of the Year. In 2016, the Osage Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution honored Jane as the American History Teacher of the Year. Community activities include 4-H and the Chamber of Commerce Leadership Sedalia program. She has also served on the Sacred Heart Parish Council.

She is a legend in her own time. Underclassmen, who whisper her name with trepidation, become alumni who speak of her with much respect and admiration. One comment heard from everyone who encounters McMullin in the classroom is that she truly enjoys what she does. Ms. McMullin's "intensity, passion, and love for history and for her students is incredibly rare," writes Devin Wadley, former student of McMullin's. "She is loved and highly respected by her students and has inspired so many to love American History as she does."

Marcia Turner adds: "Is there anyone more magnificent than Ms. McMullin? I have been privileged to have her as a student - then as a colleague - then as a friend - and then, most importantly as a 'second daughter.' Her knowledge, compassion, and professionalism is unsurpassed. There is no better reason to send your son or daughter to Sacred Heart than for your student to experience her knowledge and instruction. We are so blessed to have her. In a word, she is fabulous!"



Father Andrew Brunswick C.PP.S.

As pastor and founder of Sedalia Catholic High School (renamed Sacred Heart High School in 1946), Fr. Brunswick quite literally laid the foundation for secondary Catholic education in Sedalia.

Fr. Andy, as many knew him, was born October 30, 1895 in Wendelin, Ohio. He entered the Society of the Precious Blood in 1910, was incorporated in 1918, and was ordained to the priesthood on May 13, 1923. His first assignment was to Sacred Heart Church as assistant pastor (1923-1929). It would be his return in 1940 that would forever change the landscape of Catholic education in Sedalia.

The first makings of a Catholic high school actually started with the Sisters of St. Joseph, who had conducted a private academy for girls at St. Patrick's from 1890-1905. The author of *A History of Sacred Heart Parish 1882-1968* wrote: "There is a prelude to the origin of our high school. As far back as the early 1920s, the parents were becoming concerned about their children after they left the grade school. After World War I, the Ku Klux Klan became active in Sedalia and a wave of anti-Catholic bigotry reached into the schools. High school students received minimal religious instruction and their lack of contact with a Catholic atmosphere began to tell."

For the next 20 years, various youth programs were implemented, but the desire for a parish high school did not die out. In 1940, Fr. Brunswick returned to Sacred Heart Church as pastor, knowing of the request from Bishop O'Hara "that the high school should be begun immediately."

"I don't know how enthusiastic Fr. Andy was in starting a high school, but because the Bishop asked that he start a regional school, he followed through," said Fr. Mark Miller C.PP.S. According to the parish history book, constructing a stand-alone building for the high school under the urgent timeline was out of the question, so the grade school and high school would be combined under one building. The high school became a reality though on a much smaller scale than hoped for. It would be administered by Sacred Heart parish but available to all Catholic students of the area.

On September 22, 1941, Sedalia Catholic High School opened its doors to welcome 27 students as its pioneer freshman class. Each succeeding year another class was added. Accommodating an increase in students and meeting high school accreditation standards was not an easy task. Simply put in the historical records, the author said: "How Fr. Brunswick managed to ready the school each year is hard to see." Stairs were torn out, restrooms, a gym, and science lab were added. The pioneer class was only weeks away from receiving its high school diplomas when, on May 7, 1945, Sedalia Catholic High School

was recognized by the Committee of Accredited school. An excerpt from the diary of Shirley (Weimholt) Schieberl '45 dated May 10, 1945, states: "How happy everyone was to hear on this evening, that Sedalia Catholic High School was recognized. There's no doubt but that the work had been achieved only through the untiring efforts of Fr. Brunswick. It was he who worked and labored mentally and physically to have a Catholic High School in Sedalia. Every student owes a great debt of gratitude for his interest in the cause of Secondary Education."

In addition to Fr. Andy's labor of love, he never lost sight of being a shepherd to his people. He was a traditional German with a rather stern appearance and approach to life. Standing on (back then) an elevated pulpit to deliver "long, fire and brimstone sermons" certainly added to his formidable demeanor. "If you messed up in school, you did not want to see him," recalls Bill Hodges '52. "I remember Fr. Andy training Don Stohr '52 and me to be the first master servers of the High Solemn Mass. He tested us and trained us. It had to be right, but he wasn't really mean. He took care of the people and the parish. He was very involved in the community. He was a true priest."

Firmin Boul '55 remembers being "in awe of Fr. Brunswick. He was a kind person and dedicated to his mission as a priest." As a young boy, Richard Bahner '70 remembers being "frightened" at times during Fr. Brunswick's sermon, "but the picture that wins out in my mind is of him knowing my name and greeting me with it, sometimes even bending to extend a hand. I have never forgotten that voice that could be so soft, kind and friendly."

Fr. Andy left Sacred Heart in 1958 and served at St. Peter and St. Paul in Cole Camp (1958-1966) and St. Ann in Warsaw (1966-1972). He retired from active duties in 1972 and passed away May 10, 1974.

When Fr. Andy arrived at Sacred Heart in 1940, enrollment was steady around 200. In his last year as pastor of Sacred Heart in 1958, total enrollment for elementary and high school was at 542. Because of his determination and perseverance, over 1,900 students have graduated from Sacred Heart High School steeped in faith, and prepared to serve.
