



ment and public services sector for Deloitte, a leading global provider of audit and assurance, consulting, financial advisory, risk advisory, tax and related services.







Team One: Governance and Leadership

Structure school leadership for optimal success

Strategic Initiative #1: Over the next 2-3 years, establish a President/Principal model along with a Finance Director that would work with, meet with and be financially accountable for Sacred Heart School and all three parishes.

Progress to date: Finance Director was hired June, 2018. The president/principal model (including finance director) was approved in March, 2018. As enrollment grows, transition to President/Principal will occur.

Strategic Initiative #2: Initiate School Advisory Council (SAC) training and continuing education

Progress to date: Responsibility lies with administrator and pastor. Diocese offers training.

Achieve sustainable sources of revenue

Strategic Initiative #1: Research, study and institute some form of Cost-Based/Needs-Based Tuition for Sacred Heart School. Progress to date: Phased CBNB plan introduced to school family April, 2018. 2018-19 is voluntary transition year. Full implementation in 2019-2020. Administrator and Finance Director are finalizing and fine tuning the plan to begin meeting with families as soon as possible in preparation for next school year.

Strategic Initiative #2: Fully develop a vibrant alumni outreach in order to further engage Sacred Heart alumni into the life of the school, with the goal of 50% participation by alumni over the next five years.

<u>Progress to date</u>: Alumni golf tournament moved to Monday in fall at Sedalia Country Club. A free family fun event immediately followed. Foundation helps via email communications, annual magazine, and database management. Alumni committee established in Oct. 2018 to expand upon alumni engagement.

Strategic Initiative #3: Develop an education program for all parents and parishioners throughout the year in which the overall Sacred Heart School and Foundation budgets are explained, thereby providing full transparency.

Progress to date: Information was delivered to school family April, 2018. School leaders scheduling meetings with parish organizations to share updates.

Make Catholic education available and affordable

Strategic Initiative #1: Modify and promote the Adopt-a-Student program.

Progress to date: Planning to address in the months ahead.

Next Steps: Determine who will take on this responsibility.

Strategic Initiative #2: Consistently educate the Catholic Community on SCRIP, Shoparoo and Box Tops incentive programs. Progress to date: SCRIP promotion to the Parish is in effect for the holiday season. Additional SCRIP Coordinators and SCRIP Champions on board to advocate, educate and assist others with set up. Shoparoo and Box Tops programs are managed by the SHS Active Parents Club.

Next Steps: Include information on these programs as a welcome packet to new families.

Strategic Initiative #3: Fully implement a Work-Study program at Sacred Heart School.

Progress to date: Volunteer coordinator is in place and a plan is in the final stage of development for the 2019-2020 school year. By building a greater stewardship program involving families, they will feel more connected with a greater sense of belonging. With time, increased volunteerism could reduce school costs, and increase affordability.

Next steps: Finalize the program and implement with tuition contracts for 2019-2020.

Team Two: Community

Build unity among all three parish families and SHS

Strategic Initiative #1: Begin dialogue toward re-structuring three parishes into one parish under unified leadership with one Catholic Community Pastoral Council.

Progress to date: Initiative under directive of pastor and the parish council of Sacred Heart, St. Patrick and St. John. Strategic Initiative #2: Create a parish and school annual calendar in order to establish better levels of communication of both parish and school events for all school families and Catholic community parish families.

Progress to date: In conceptual phase.

Strategic Initiative #3: Create and offer K-12 Spanish language training, as well as adult Spanish/English classes.

Progress to date: Communication sent out in the fall of 2019 to guage school and parish interest in program.

Strategic Initiative #4: Plan and offer bi-lingual school masses on a quarterly basis.

Progress to date: Worship & Spiritual Life working to aquire Spanish hymnals for Sacred Heart Church by fall 2019.

Build stronger relationships with Sedalia and surrounding communities

Strategic Initiative #1: Interact with the home-school community in order to include them in school communications and activiites that are applicable.

Progress to date: Planning to address in the months ahead.

Strategic Initiative #2: Have school administrators actively participate in the Chamber of Commerce and have SHS host "Business after Hours" events twice per year.

Progress to date: Both Administration and Foundation representatives attend meetings regularly. Will address after hours programs in the months ahead.

Team Three: Communication

Project and communicate a positive image

Strategic Initiative #1: Involve students and parents in active roles in Sunday Liturgy and parish activities.

<u>Progress to date</u>: Collaborating with parish Worship & Spiritual Life committee to expand participation at children's Mass and other parish-driven programs such as the St. Pat's children's choir, teen youth program, church decorating and Family Advent Night.

Strategic Initiative #2: Create a strong and written Marketing Plan for Sacred Heart School that incorporates all communication vehicles - website, personal outreach, social media, e-mails, direct mail, videos, ambassador teams, and signage - with strong emphasis on personal testimonies from students, parents, faculty, alumni, and parishioners. Emphasis needs to be as much on internal communication where everyone is an informed advocate as well as on external communication.

<u>Progress to date</u>: Developed branding guidelines for cohesive and positive image. Creating video testimonials to share the SHS experience. Providing ongoing support of immediate and long-term facility beautification projects. Developing marketing materials, including a document that clearly articulates the value of a SHS education.

Communicate progress of the Strategic Growth Plan

Strategic Initiative #1: Create a Communications Committee that will be responsible for communicating the organization, the implementation, and the progress of this Strategic Growth Plan. Build in to the communication plan the ability to report outcomes, benchmarks and milestones in terms of reporting progress of the SGP.

Progress to date: Developed and distributed tri-fold brochure in April 2018 to alumni, parents and parishioners rolling out details of the SGP. Will continue to utilize the website, bulletin, e-mail distribution and annual From the Heart magazine to share ongoing progress.



Team Four: People Engagement

Retain and attract quality teachers

Strategic Initiative #1: Engage diocese in benefit package enhancement discussion, including retirement and reimbursement for continuing education.

Progress to date: Authority rests with Diocese, administrator and pastor.

Strategic Initiative #2: Develop a creative promotional package (to be used at placement fairs, college and university placement offices, etc.) that will highlight the many advantages of teaching at Sacred Heart School. Create innovative incentives for teachers at SHS.

Progress to date: Identify events to engage with prospective new hires. Promo packages in creation include faculty testimonials, school highlights and advantages of being an educator at SHS.

Strategic Initiative #3: Focus on growing the Sacred Heart Foundation corpus in order to support faculty and administration raises at 90% or more of Sedalia public school scale.

Progress to date: Champion activities that increase understanding and awareness about the Foundation within the community. Enhance "TEAM" culture (Together Everyone Achieves More). Collaborate and act strategically for long-term success.

Retain and attract students

Strategic Initiative #1: Establish Parent and Student Ambassador Teams that can reach out to all possible feeder sources both in Pettis County and beyond with appealing messages built around the new mission/vision statement and Top 10 Selling points; incorporate into the new overall Marketing Plan

Progress to date: Revised International Exchange application structure and process. Developed and executed outreach plan to identify and attract host family prospects. Identified key target student recruitment groups and 1-2 champions for each. Planned and executed 1-2 types of personal engagement with each group built around existing marketing materials. Continue to build and grow on plan each year.

Strategic Initiative #2: Formally establish a Big Sister/Little Sister and Big Brother/Little Brother mentoring system throughout Sacred Heart School.

Progress to date: Initiative supported through SHS new family mentoring system and Rachel's Families.

Increase family involvement

Strategic Initiative #1: Develop the Parent Ambassador Team to plan social events and family mentor programs for all families in Sacred Heart School.

> Progress to date: Initial plans included a mother/son kickball tournament in May that was canceled due to rain. Committee will continue to identify new areas of opportunities to enhance family engagement while supporting existing programs.

Strategic Initiative #2: Implement a service program for all Sacred Heart families to include family service hours.

> Progress to date: In preliminary discussions on if and how a service program might be integrated with the CBNB tuition model.

"Pioneer" Class of 1945

"Four years ago, in 1941, 27 wondering and determined pupils gathered with their teacher, Sister Mary Rosetta, for the first time, to begin their high school career.

During the four years this class established a glee club, a Student Council, athletic teams, pep squad and various other school organizations. They have shown a fine school spirit and loyalty in all their undertakings.

They shall leave behind them precious memories and a grand tradition of being the first graduating class, but they shall take with them lessons well-taught in religious, social and educational matters.

This class has established the foundation on which the school shall grow in the future. They leave to the classes who follow, the responsibility of raising the standard of the school as high as possible. And to this class of graduates the school says, "Thank you" and "Good Luck"! ~ School Echoes, May, 1945

On Sept 8, 1941, 27 students registered to become the first fresh-

man class of the newly founded Sedalia Catholic High School (shortly after renamed Sacred Heart High School). Their days were filled with studies. much the same as our students now. It's hard to fathom that three months into their freshman year - on Dec 7, 1941 - the United States was attacked, and our country was launched into World War II.

Throughout their high school years, war efforts at home soon became part of the "daily routine." Even the school's mascot wasn't immune. When pilots experienced mishaps in the airplanes, they blamed the "gremlins" on board. Inspired by their mischievous and endearing character, the Gremlin mascot came to be a treasured part of our school's identity. The class soon became the upper classmen and women the following classes would look up to. They continued blazing the trail, but always being ever mindful of keeping in touch with their classmates no matter how much time and distance separated them.

Whether it's stepping out onto the stage or the court, we still cheer

on our Gremlins, and sing our Alma Mater wearing red and white with pride, just like our founding classmates did.

Richard "Dick" Pfeiffer is known for his longstanding loyalty and service to the Sacred Heart community. A grandson of Gerlach Pfeiffer, who was a founder of Sacred Heart parish, Dick 's active participation in the church and school has helped to preserve and to enhance the work his grandfather helped begin back in 1882.


Dick was born to Charles and Mary (Dick) Pfeiffer. A member of Sacred Heart since birth, he attended Sacred Heart School in both elementary and high school. During his time at SHS, he participated in Boy Scouts, basketball and baseball. Dick was also elected the Senior Class President of his Class of 1961.

Following graduation, Dick served our country in the United States Navy from 1961-1965. The

Navy trained him as an electronic technician in submarine and nuclear power. This training helped him find employment as a Validation Engineer of missile silos and also as a cable television technician and electrician. Dick retired in 2005.

Dick's volunteer work at Sacred Heart Church and School is farreaching. He has served as a Boy Scout Leader, School Board President, and bus driver, in addition to planning class reunions. He has spent many hours helping with maintenance, painting and electrical tasks at the school. Dick has also served in the parish as a lector, a member of the Administration Commission, and a general volunteer for the Sacred Heart Bazaar.

Rev. Vince Hoying, C.PP.S.

Father Vince Hoying, C.PP.S, a beloved priest and pastor, made a profound impact on the Sacred Heart community. His dedication to the longevity of Sacred Heart School and its community is remembered by those who know him.

Born in Ohio to Charles and Agnes Hoying, Father Vince attended Brunnerdale Seminary in Canton, Ohio, for high school, graduating in 1949. He became a member of the Society of the Precious Blood through the Ritual of Incorporation in 1952. After studying theology, philosophy, and practicum, Vince was ordained a priest on June 1, 1958, in Carthagena, Ohio.


Fr. Vince served Sacred Heart Parish and School from 1971-1980, shepherding his flock with enthusiasm and compassion. A strong advocate for Catholic schools, Fr. Vince was a guardian and champion for Sacred Heart School. Under his leadership, he refused to entertain the idea of closing Sacred Heart School. Instead, his passion and perseverance generated a renewed energy among the community and recommitment to Catholic education, which would serve as a catalyst for sustainability and growth in the years to come.

Fr. Vince spent a total of 31 years serving as a pastor or associate pastor in several parishes in Michigan, Kentucky, Missouri, Iowa, and Oklahoma. He also spent 12 years in hospital ministry in Ohio. He also served as the vocation director and council member for his religious order.

In 2004. Fr. Vince volunteered to return to the Sacred Heart community, where he served until his official retirement in 2008.

Fr. Vince's personality and approachability quickly endeared him to parishioners, students, faculty, staff, and alumni.

In 2008, a special ceremony was held to name Sacred Heart's east gymnasium the Fr. Vincent Hoying gymnasium in his honor.

Col. Philip J. White, USAF (Ret.) '48

Col. Philip White is a distinguished war hero, pilot, sailor, and world traveler. During his 27-year career with the United States Air Force (USAF), Philip was assigned to 30 different units, and earned 23 awards and decorations, including the Silver Star. He served as First Commander of the "Red Flag" training group, which developed aerial training combat exercises that are still in practice by the USAF. Despite these accomplishments, Col Philip J. White said: "One of my best achievements was being able to send my four grandchildren through Sacred Heart School. It was the best thing I knew to do for them because I knew what it produced."

Born to William and Sarah White in Sedalia, Philip was baptized at Sacred Heart Church. At the age of five, his family became members of St. Patrick Parish, where he is still a member. Philip attended elementary school at St. Patrick, and high school at Sacred Heart, where he excelled both academically and athletically. His interests included basketball, baseball, Catholic Youth Council, and choir.

Following graduation in 1948, Philip continued his education at Rockhurst University in Kansas City. In 1950, he was forced to halt his academics and enlist in the military. He eventually returned to the classroom to earn a Bachelor of Science degree in Aerospace Engineering from the University of Arizona, Tuscon, Ariz. (1962), and a Master's of Science degree in Political Science from Auburn University, Auburn, Ala. (1967).

During his 27-year military career with the USAF, Philip served in both the Korean War and Vietnam War. He was a commander with the Misty FACs, a group of combatexperienced fighter pilots that flew missions into heavily defended North Vietnam. His awards and decorations include the Silver Star, Legion of Merit, Distinguished Flying Cross (2), Bronze Star, Presidential Unit Citation, Outstanding Unit Award (2) and 15 Air Medals.


In 1976, Col. White was named the Commander of the 440th Tactical Fighter Training Group. Nicknamed, "Red Flag," this group, under Col. White's leadership, trained pilots through realistically simulated combat missions in a safe training environment. This training intended to significantly increase the odds of a fighter pilot surviving actual combat. Today, Exercise Red Flag is a two-

week advanced aerial combat training exercise held several times a year by the United States Air Force.

After retiring from the USAF in 1977, Philip worked as a staff engineer at Martin-Marietta in Littleton, Colo. He then started Sandia Airways, an air charter/ambulance service in Albuquerque, New Mexico. Retiring for the second time, Philip embarked on a sailboat voyage from California through the Panama Canal, and touring the Caribbean before landing in Galveston, Texas,

Wanting to be close to family, Philip returned to Sedalia in 1994. He is an active member of St. Patrick, and has volunteered with the VFW and American Legion.

Meals on Wheels is an activity he continues today. Philip was married to the late Laury Weir. They have a daughter, Lisa (White) Tanguay, a son-inlaw, Randy, and four grandchildren: Amanda (Kessman) Kreisel '08; Caleb Tanguay '14; Lauron Tanguay '15; and Micah Tanguay '18.

Christopher Lawson '85

Chris Lawson's childhood passion for soccer evolved into a successful coaching career that has garnered state and national accolades. Known and admired for his integrity and exemplary coaching, Chris is considered one of the "go-to" coaches by Missouri State High School Athletic Association (MSHSAA). His personal involvement in the game and his policy making on committees has helped to promote and perpetuate the game of soccer.

Born in Wurtzburg, Germany, to the late Oscar and Barbara Lawson, Chris grew up in California before relocating to Sedalia in late elementary school. During high school, Chris was involved in the school play, baseball, basketball, and soccer. Following graduation from SHS in 1985, Chris earned an associate's degree from State Fair Community College (1987), a bachelor's degree from Park University (1989), a Master of Arts in Teaching from Webster University (1997), and a master's in educational administration from William Woods University (2005).

Since 1985, Chris has taught and coached at Rockhurst High School, a private, Roman Catholic, Jesuit, all-boys, preparatory school in Kansas City, Mo. At present, he serves as the Social Studies Department Chair, AP and US government instructor, and head soccer coach. In his 24vears as coach, the Rockhurst Hawklets have garnered seven state championships, four second-place finishes, and eight third-place finishes. Chris' awards include: MSHSAA Coaches Association Hall of Fame and KC Metro Coach of the Year. Chris was selected by ESPN to be a representative of high school coaches in a nationally-televised panel discussion on the implementation of professionally sponsored soccer academy teams.

Chris' advocacy on behalf of small schools was influential in the formation of MSHSAA establishing a Class 4 boys soccer. Chris serves as a volunteer clinician for multiple soccer groups in the Kansas City area, including two years with TOPS, a soccer club for youth with disabilities. Even



though he is a highly respected and sought after coach, Chris has never forgotten his roots and invites Sacred Heart soccer players to attend his very popular annual camp free of charge.

Always speaking highly of SHS, one of Chris's mantras is "never forget where you came from." Chris lives out this mantra in many ways including assisting with the delivery of meals for the annual Christmas Eve dinners sponsored by the Sacred Heart School National Honor Society. Chris has two sons. Owen and Caleb. He is also a member of the Knights of Columbus.

Lee C. Redmond '57

Lee Redmond has excelled as a scientist, mentor, and international leader in the field of fisheries science. During his employment with the Missouri Department of Conservation, he received numerous professional awards and personal accolades, earning him national recognition for his innovative approach and success in conserving and enhancing fisheries in the state of Missouri and nationally.

Lee was born to Lee C. and Nadvne (Grother) Redmond in Sedalia, Missouri. He attended Sacred Heart School for both elementary and high school. In high school, Lee participated in a variety of activities including Student Council, playing basketball and softball, Camera Club, and serving as an altar server. He worked for Sacred Heart for three summers as a maintenance employee. Lee also earned a scholastic letter for three years in high school. He was president of his class and graduated Valedictorian of his class in 1957.

During his pursuit of higher education, Lee earned a B.S. in Biology from Central Missouri State University in 1961 and a Masters in Zoology from the University of Missouri in 1964. He was employed by the Missouri Department of Conservation upon graduation. During his 37 years with the Conservation Department, Lee became a valued leader. His life's work has had a profound impact on the conservation of our aquatic resources and on those he mentored.

Following his retirement in 1998, he was elected into the National Fisheries Hall of Excellence in 2001. Lee lives with his wife.

Mary Jo (Welliver) McMullin '51

Mary Jo McMullin epitomized what it means to live a life of service. She considered nursing her vocation and embodied the role of caregiver to her community. A lifelong member of Sacred Heart Church and an inductee of the Missouri 4-H Hall of Fame, Mary Jo spent her life giving to her community and would continually comment on how Sacred Heart had prepared her well for her life calling.

Mary Jo was born in 1933 in Springfork to Robert and Rose Mary (Alt) Welliver. She attended Sacred Heart for elementary and high school, graduating in 1951. She continued her education at St. Mary's and Donnelly College, in Kansas City, Ks. She received her nursing diploma from St. Mary's Hospital School of Nursing in Kansas City, Mo., in 1954.

Mary Jo married the late Jesse McMullin in 1955 at Sacred Heart Church. In that same year, she took a nursing job at Bothwell Hospital in Sedalia. During that time, she received additional stoma nurse training at Jewish Hospital in St. Louis and earned a Bachelor of Science in Nursing from Webster University in St. Louis. She served the Sedalia community as a Registered Nurse for over 50 years, many of which were spent helping cancer patients live with their ileostomies or colostomies through her private ostomy service. In 1984, Mary Jo served as Bothwell's Nursing Administrator, a position she held until her retirement in 1996.

Attendees burst into laughter and applause as Lee dons his SHS letterman jacket during the Hall of Fame banquet. On a typical day, Lee's jacket hangs in the back of his '57 Ford,



4-H was another passion for Mary Jo. She served in various roles during her 40-year involvement with the organization, including a 20-year role as Community Leader for the R-1 Hustlers 4-H Club. Mary Jo also was a fixture at 4-H Camp, where she served as a camp counselor and nurse for over forty years. By the time her grandchildren were in 4-H, it wasn't uncommon for kids and adults to come up to her in public and call her Grandma, since that was how she became known at camp. She was involved at the University of Missouri Extension Center as a member and past president of the Pettis County Extension Council. She was also a member and past president of the Agriculture Committee in Pettis County. In 2006, she was inducted into the Missouri 4-H Hall of Fame.

Not only did she have an extensive nursing career and involvement with 4-H, Mary Jo was dedicated to Sacred Heart. She was involved in various school and church activities throughout her life. She took pride in her Sacred Heart education and in seeing her four children - Jim '74, Tom '83, Rose '84 and Jane '87 and three grandchildren - Matt '01, Ben '08 and Laura '09 - attend her alma mater. She missed very few athletic competitions during her years as parent and grandparent. Some of the lucky teammates of either her children or grandchildren also got to experience her cooking abilities when she hosted team dinners. Mary Jo would have loved knowing that two of her great-grandchildren currently attend Sacred Heart.





In Memoriam





Alysia Marquez and Brian Sierra were the Class of 2019 recipients of the American Youth Foundation "National


